
## John R. Huhn, III

CHERRY HILL— With Sgt. 1st Class Kenneth Sineath, going above and beyond the call of duty takes on a new meaning.

The Army para-

trooper returned from Afghanistan last month after his third tour of duty.

And come the spring, he'll be deploving on his fourth stint. To where, the special-ops soldier wouldn't say.

On Saturday, Sineath's extraordinary dedication to country was cele-

brated as hundreds gathered outside the Cherry Hill home of his fiancee, Jessica Giacoboni.

Heralded by the roar of the Warriors Watch and 'Nam

Knights motorcycle clubs, Sineath and Giacoboni arrived at the Massachusetts Avenue house in a convertible stretch limousine.

Under a bright, blue autumn sky, neighbors, friends and family lined the street waving American flags and speed. We salute you." cheering. A huge version of the stars and stripes was hung from the rescue bucket of a firetruck.

"I don't know even how to describe this," said Sineath, 28, as he surveyed the crowd. "I'm overwhelmed. Never in my wildest dreams would I have expected something like this.

"I almost cried."

Sineath was presented with more than a half-dozen proclamations.

# 9th Annual Thanksgiving For The Troops

A crowd of about 1,000 area residents blanketed one side of the Americas Best Choice Hotel's parking lot off Route 70 on Thanksgiving morning to greet four busloads of soldiers from Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst.

The troops had no idea they were headed to a surprise Thanksgiving dinner at the inn's Palace of Asia Ballroom.

It was the 9th annual Feed the Troops Thanksgiving Day celebration. Our American Legion is a sponsor for this annual event.

As the buses slid one at a time in front of the hotel entrance, sur-

rounded by hundreds of motorcycles that escorted them in, veterans shouted to the crowd to "make a hole, make a hole." The Joint Base soldiers debarked and saluted Col. Jeffrey Doll, commander of Army Support at the base.

Once again, Legion members came out in force for this annual event.



















# WWII Remains returning to New Jersey - Staff Sergeant Zoltan Joseph Dobovich, US Army Air Corps

On Nov. 1, 1946, Staff Sergeant Zoltan Joseph Dobovich, US Army Air Corps and seven



other crew members were aboard a B-17G Flying Fortress that went missing after departing from Naples, Italy, bound for Boving-

ton, England. During the months following the loss, search and rescue attempts proved unsuc-

cessful and the remains of the crewmen were declared nonrecoverable.

In 1947, a French military unit operating in the French-Italian Alps, near Estellette Glacier, found the wreckage of a U.S. aircraft at an altitude of more than 12,000 feet. The French team recovered human remains from the site which were turned over to U.S. officials. They also reported that much of the ice-covered wreckage would likely not emerge for 30 years, after the glacier descended the slope. Due to the technology limitations of the time,

the remains could not be attributed to.

Until now.

More than 60 years after he was declared deceased, his remains will be flown into Philadelphia International Airport on 24 Dec 2012 and escorted to the Perinchief Funeral Home in Mt Holly for a Service. On 27 December 2012 Staff Sergeant Dobovich will be laid to rest at the BG William C. Doyle Memorial Cemetery in Wrightstown, NJ.

### Bronze Star Awarded to Local Veteran

Arthur Seltzer, a World War II Army veteran of D-Day, the Battle of

the Bulge, and the liberation of Dachau, was nearly silenced by all the tradedy



he saw, but he began to open up to his family, and then the community, in recent years, bringing to light his actions during one of history's greatest battles. On Nov. 22,

at the 9th Annual Feed the Troops Thanksgiving Day Celebration in Cherry Hill, he received an honor that's been 68 years in the making-the Bronze Star. Seltzer, 87, the former Jewish War Veterans New Jersey State and Post 126



commander, blew up radio equipment as the enemy advanced during the Battle of the

Bulge, putting himself in danger before retreating, to ensure it wouldn't fall into the wrong hands. He was supposed to be bestowed the Bronze Star in 1966, but it never came. His former commander saw a recent news segment on Fox News, in which Seltzer described his harrowing experiences on Omaha Beach and throughout Europe, and was able to verify the missing information needed for Seltzer to receive this well-deserved honor.

# Home for the Brave, a service of the Volunteers of America of the Delaware Valley, will offer housing and services to homeless veterans throughout Camden County

On Wednesday morning, (12/12/2012), Brigadier Gen. James J. Grant made a call to commanders on the ground in Afghanistan. He spoke with two officers from the

New Jersey National Guard's 117th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion: Lt. Col. Paul Rumberger and Major Gen. Ed Dowgin.

The conversation

among the three lasted only a few minutes - just long enough for Grant to explain that he would attend a ribbon-cutting ceremony that day for a new homeless shelter for veterans in the Delaware Valley.

There was silence on the line. Then came the response from over-

"Thank you."

According to the Delaware Valley chapter of Volunteers of America, which opened the new, 20,000square-foot wing of its Camden homeless shelter specifically designed for veterans, 20 percent of all homeless people in Camden County are veterans.

Nationally, the chapter says, there are 100,000 homeless veterans on the streets on any given night. Nearly half of them are Vietnam War veterans, and 18 percent have what Volunteers of America de-

scribes as "serious mental health issues." In addition, homeless veterans are more likely to suffer from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

"I am speaking to you now from what used to be just a parking lot," said Gina Adams, chief operating officer of Volunteers of America in the Delaware

Valley and director of the new

homeless veterans' shelter on Atlantic Avenue. She stood among local military and legislative officials applauding the new facility.

She added: "We started this many

years ago with just a grant application and a wing and a prayer."

Volunteers of America has been operating the Aletha R. Wright Vision of Hope Center for

homeless, single men since 1991. However, according to Volunteers of America Delaware Valley CEO Dan Lombardo, officials at the nonprofit noticed an increasing number of U.S. military veterans among the men they were assisting.

"Absolutely, there were a lot of veterans coming through here, and we were helping them, getting them to the [Department of Veterans Affairs], and we decided to have this new facility for them, so they can have more privacy and so we can better serve their needs," he said.

Officials broke ground on the new wing, called "Home of the Brave," on March 27. Funded through a "patchwork" of state and federal grants, contributions from local banks and private donations, the project cost \$2.4 million, according to Lombardo.

The veterans' wing houses 30

beds — two in each dormitorysized room as well as multiple common areas and interview rooms.

There is al-

ready a waiting list of about 30 homeless veterans, many of whom are residents of various "tent cities" in Camden County, ready to move in, the CEO said.

"We have several from the tent cities on the way," Lombardo said. "We hope to have the shelter filled by the end of the month."

Grant, the Joint Staff director at the New Jersey National Guard Joint Force headquarters at Fort Dix, said it was "absolutely unacceptable" that so many veterans

find themselves homeless after returning from serving their

country abroad.

He applauded officials who championed the expansion, stating they understand the problem of homeless veterans that's facing this country.

"You not only get it, but you get it right," he said.

Later, he added: "When I was speaking to the commanders on the ground in Afghanistan, I told



them what I was going to be doing today, and they said

'Thank you,' because they know the soldiers are going to come home after serving — and they know that some are going to have issues, and some could become homeless.


