PROGRESS REPORT ON LANDSCAPING

George Donovan, chairman of landscaping, has announced that Paul Formigli has offered to engineer the project. Mr. Formigli has already contacted Malcolm Wells, Architect. Mr. Wells and Mr. Formigli have made drawings of the Post Home outlining the work to be done and pictures of the finished project.

The following letter was received by Mr. Formigli from Mr. Wells dated June 24, 1959. Dear Paul: Here are your plans and the photo I was looking at. It shows what a difference proper landscaping will make. In spite of the current down at the heels look, it is possible to make this one of the best looking buildings in the state. Properly finished the rugged simplicity of the design will express the real nature of Legion activities and purpose.

But no halfway measures will do — those banks should all be ivy-covered to eliminate maintenance, and the bushes and trees must be more than weed-sized. I wouldn't hesitate to recommend a \$2,500 planting program—all it takes is enough interest. You raised \$20,000 for the building and its all going to waste until this job is done. We've seen a lot of similar schemes sold once people have been made to realize the importance of such investments. GOOD LUCK!
